

What Binds Us

Anne Laval

Over a year, throughout all seasons, a little girl growing as fast as a flower spends time with her grandmother, ageing slowly like a tree. The little one asks questions. The one who is not so tall answers...

"Flowers, fruit, leaves, puddles, seeds, and trees. Life is a circle" says Granny.

From spring to winter, the reader follows the everyday moments shared between a little girl and her grandma, the little one's questions, and the elderly's answers. One's height can be measured according to trees and flowers – everything grows. The mum is close by, appearing from time to time. Three girls then stand together, among the living

and whilst time passes by. The grandma is a bit of an artist; at the heart of the book, she weaves a rug; attachment and love are woven every day, too.

Anne Laval beautifully tells of "what binds" one generation to the next, a girl to the other. She also evokes the bonds between tiny human beings and the rest of the world.

- The way the child thinks and speaks is highly accurate: with snippets of observations and questions that come up naturally throughout the pages, simple and yet philosophical, the way children truly are.

Her work is regularly shown in festivals or art centres. Anne Laval does drawings for the press (*Télérama*, *The New Yorker*, *La revue XXI...*) and has already published numerous picture books for many publishers (Le Rouergue, Actes Sud, Sarbacane...) What Binds Us is her first book with Les Fourmis Rouges. She lives in Strasbourg, Alsace.


A hilarious, exhilarating book where the invisible becomes visible! Or when the infinitely small encounters the infinitely large...

Throughout the book, the reader zooms out from panel to panel and scales evolve from one page to the next, until we find ourselves... right in the middle of the palm of a child's hand.

The child himself is in a schoolyard in a city which is in a region which is part of a country which is on a planet which belongs to a solar system which is in the infinitely large. Wait - doesn't the infinitely large look surprisingly like the infinitely small? Bam, Bertie, and Claude pop up again!

And just like that, the circle is complete.







- A book to read out loud, to fully enjoy all the onomatopoeia intertwined with the dialogue.



Hi There! is her second book published at Les Fourmis Rouges.

















Ulysse

In a snow-covered city garden, a child builds a snowman and names him Ulysse. But things don't start off too well for our snowman: first, snow never lasts in town. Second, the child abandons him, leaving him all alone in this freezing town.

So, he escapes in his thoughts, daydreaming about the high life. To be able to stroll into town, to discover the cafes, to go to the cinema, to the hairdresser's, and even to find the love that will melt his heart (but, alas, not only his heart...)

Once again, Alexandra Pichard has produced a book that is smart, beautiful, and witty. There are a ton of picture books featuring snowmen. But none of them featured such a modern one, able to live such a romantic and swinging evening!




- An effective narrative structure similar to *Toy Story*, where a snowman comes to life as soon as the child turns his back to it.

- The third picture book published with Les Fourmis Rouges, by an artist whose work is as funny as it is subtle.





Yasuke


Frédéric Marais

Embark on the exceptional destiny of Yasuke, the first Black Samurai, in this powerful initiatory tale written and illustrated by the talented Frédéric Marais.

At the foot of Mount Kilimanjaro, in Africa, lived a young slave without a name. No one ever gave him one. The slave manages to escape from his village and embarks as a sailor on a ship to Asia. In Japan, he will fulfil his exceptional destiny.

Frédéric Marais tells with great literary and graphic skills, the true story of Yasuke, the only Blackskinned Samurai. From Kilimanjaro to Mount Fuji, this young African became a hero in the 16th century. The short and rhythmic sentences, almost melodic, bring great strength to this story in a simple and bare style, within the reach of young readers. Combining black and white with an intense turquoise blue and a dark brown, the author gifts us with an initiatory tale inspired by a true story.




The Skin of the Bobcat

Mathilde Poncet


A choral picture book filled with the typical ingredients of classic tales that suddenly jumps into a very contemporary telling, filled with humour and uplifting!


Aiko

From a Tiny, Grey As a Mouse Birdy


