Marion Puech delivers a hilarious picture book, a mixture between a savory text and illustrations filled with details and lovely little people. Rest assured... this story is not just about briefs! It tackles much more meaningful topics such as self-acceptance and friendship.

STRONG POINTS:

- A HILARIOUS picture book, a hysterical text, rib-tickling illustrations!
- A story deeper than it seems, as is often the case with Les Fourmis Rouges! This book celebrates friendship, tolerance, and self-worth.
- As usual, a very neat, elaborate production: a big format, with fluorescent colours.










Marion Puech

Oskar and the Count






STRONG POINTS:


A tender yet joyful picture book about the peculiar time of grief and loss

On the island, Turtle, who is very, very old, has the feeling her life is coming to an end. She brings together all her friends, Beaver, Otter, Toad and Po, Toad's son, who adores Turtle, to let them know. Then, before closing her eyes for the last time, Turtle gives each of her friends a loving handmade souvenir. Little Po inherits a large reed and a small, mysterious nail. Simple objects which will nevertheless allow, when the time has come, to gather and celebrate Turtle.

An infinitely sweet picture book to talk to little ones about grief. A magnificent and subtle text, dynamic and joyful illustrations: a superb duo of two true artists, who bring to life an exceptionally powerful story... which is not even sad.

STRONG POINTS:

- There are many picture books about death, but only a few manage to tackle such a complex topic in such a subtle manner.
- A beautiful first collaboration between Anne Terral and Géraldine Alibeu, both renowned artists.
- Géraldine Alibeu's illustrations, a mixture of collage and painting, illuminate the striking tale by Anne Terral.
- A beautiful, joyful book about death.




Géraldine Alibeu


Darn, it looks like Nono stuck his finger in your book's fold! What if things get out of hand and Nono is stuck forever in the book?

Oh, noze! Poor Nono, having to stand in the middle of nowhere, right here on the page of your book: he's stuck. We'll have to find ways to help him pass the time. But what if... What if his finger gets stuck there all night? And what if Nono becomes a grown-up with a moustache... a dad, then a grandpa? What if Nono must spend his whole life stuck in the book? What will happen then? The ideas race throughout the pages, and so do we. Until the moment an off-camera voice calls Nono and brings us all back to reality and the present! "Nono, what are you doing? I'm waiting for you!"

Inbar Heller Algazi, interacting with her readers, invents a whole series of scenarios, starting with "What if..." Nono goes through many stages of life, without ever having... to lift a finger! A wacky and playful story built around the book itself, which says a lot about children's imagination and literature.

STRONG POINTS:

- An original, fun book toying with the idea of the book as an object, becoming the place of all possible, with the idea of "getting stuck in the book".
- A fluorescent tint on the page where Nono is stuck: a smart, efficient manufacture.
- A very talented illustrator, with a big following on social media.





The Babies Handbook for the other (people who used to be babies and forgot all about it!)


"It doesn't hold up; it talks gibberish, and it is up much too early..."

Welcome to the world of Babies! Babies are these little beings we adore but don't always understand. In three chapters, as sparkling and mischievous as babies, Élisa Géhin studies babies. How they can't stand up, the way they don't talk like us, and the way they wake up long before the night is over!

Three chapters on three essential elements: language, motor skills and sleep. Three different mini-worlds with colourful, graphic universes, in short, three mini-books in one... Élisa Géhin introduces us to the world of babies as a world of its own: all it takes is a little imagination and love to enter. A joyful, funny, and tender book to share between the baby and the grown-up, to laugh together and get closer.

STRONG POINTS:

- A talented artist well known in her professional field.
- UNESCO has designated Strasbourg as the World Book Capital for 2024. Élisa Géhin will act as an ambassador for artistic events for children, and will have a show, *Around Babies*, in the spring of 2024 in the city.


Élisa Géhin

Pauline Pinson & Magali Le Huche



Buttfish laughs with the others at his own butt face, but deep down he would like to be an ordinary fish. Tired of clowning around, he decides to swim right to the bottom of the abyss, where he meets Roundcheesefish, whose head is even weirder than his – but who is so original and witty! This is where Buttfish will discover that a 'butt head' really does look a lot like a 'heart head'.

Pauline Pinson and Magali Le Huche have been friends for a long time, and it just shows in this book. They have created an ode to difference, bizarre beauty, and friendship. But above all, they offer a good laugh to little ones... in fact, to everyone! Because to love yourself and be happy, laughing is mandatory!

STRONG POINTS:

- A hilarious story that celebrates the art of friendship and being different.
- Magali Le Huche is a very renowned author and illustrator with many successful titles such as La Tribu qui pue (20 000 copies sold) and La Grande Course des Jean with Les Fourmis Rouges. Her comic strip Nowhere Girl received an award at the Montreuil Children's Books Fair in 2021, and her comic strip Les Petites reines was awarded the special Jury Price at the Comic strip Festival of Angoulême in 2024.



Anne Laval


"Flowers, fruit, leaves, puddles, seeds, and trees. Life is a circle," says Granny.

From Spring to Winter, the reader follows the everyday moments shared between a little girl and her grandma, the little one's questions, and the elderly's answers. One's height can be measured according to trees and flowers – everything grows.

The mum is close by, appearing from time to time. Three girls then stand together, among the living and whilst time passes by. The grandma is a bit of an artist; at the heart of the book, she weaves a rug; attachment and love are woven every day, too.

Anne Laval beautifully tells of "the bond between" one generation to the next, a girl to the other. She also evokes the bonds between tiny human beings and the rest of the world.

A hilarious, exhilarating book where the invisible becomes visible! Or when the infinitely small encounters the infinitely large...

- Bertie, you still haven't had your breakfast?

Jean-Claude, a small green cell, is not able to finish his sentence before he is eaten up by Gilbert, a large blue microbe which itself is swallowed by a thick pink virus who in turn becomes the lunch of a large green amoeba! Throughout the book, the reader zooms out from panel to panel and scales evolve from one page to the next, until we find ourselves... right in the middle of the palm of a child's hand.

The child himself is in a schoolyard in a city which is in a region which is part of a country which is on a planet which belongs to a solar system which is in the infinitely large. Wait – doesn't the infinitely large look surprisingly like the infinitely small? Bam, Bertie, and Jean-Claude pop up again! And just like that, the circle is complete.

Ulysse


Alexandra Pichard

In a snow-covered city garden, a child builds a snowman and names him Ulysse. But things don't start off too well for our snowman: first, snow in town never lasts.. Second, the child abandons him, leaving him all alone in this freezing town. So, he escapes in his thoughts, daydreaming about the high life. Ah, to be able to stroll into town, to discover the cafes, to go to the cinema, to the hairdresser's, and even to find the love that will melt his heart (but, alas, not only his heart...)

Once again, Alexandra Pichard has produced a book that is smart, beautiful, and witty. There are a ton of picture books featuring snowmen. But none of them featured such a modern one, able to live such a romantic and swinging evening!

Frédéric Marais


Embark on the exceptional destiny of Yasuke, the first Black Samurai, in this powerful initiatory tale written and illustrated by the talented Frédéric Marais.

At the foot of Mount Kilimanjaro, in Africa, lived a young slave without a name. No one ever gave him one. The slave manages to escape from his village and embarks as a sailor on a ship to Asia. In Japan, he will fulfil his exceptional destiny.

Frédéric Marais tells with great literary and graphic skills, the true story of Yasuke, the only Black-skinned Samurai. From Kilimanjaro to Mount Fuji, this young African became a hero in the 16th century. The short and rhythmic sentences, almost melodic, bring great strength to this story in a simple and bare style, within the reach of young readers. Combining black and white with an intense turquoise blue and a dark brown, the author gifts us with an initiatory tale inspired by a true story.

The Strange Collection of Mamita


