




Marie Mirgaine

The Youngest

Lisbeth Renardy and Thomas Medard

The place of the youngest, last in the bathwater and first in bed: worst place in the siblings or place of the family favourite?

Eugène is the youngest of his siblings. He's the last to inherit the grey bike or the battered clothes, the last to use the bathwater but always the first to go to bed... In essence, Eugène, being the third child, often feels like an outsider. When he realizes his older siblings no longer seek him during hide-and-seek, he decides he's had enough.

His runaway attempt only takes him to the end of the road, but it's enough for him to realize that being the youngest is crucial, and not a permanent role!

This heartfelt title captures true sadness with humor and great tenderness, helping us overlook sibling spats and embrace the joy of 'being a family'.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- A fundamental theme, about one's place in the family and hierarchy among siblings. It poses a universal question: is the last position the best or the worst?
- An accurate and humorous depiction of teenagers.
 The text is narrated from the younger brother's viewpoint, featuring illustrations that show teenagers with oversized limbs and hair obscuring their eyes, poised to avenge all younger siblings!
- Since her first collaboration with Les Fourmis Rouges (*L'Étrange collection de Mamita*), Lisbeth Renardy has brilliantly continued her rising career as an illustrator.




Thomas Medard

If your name is Lou Mouchette and you reside in a home that your mother has turned into a shelter for wild animals, friendly but intrusive, how do you express your desire for tranquility and a cat... one that's stuffed?


Lou Mouchette's mother founded *Refuge Mouchette*. So, Lou is always with animals... real ones. Tigers climbing curtains, swans needing to be taken to the park before school, and elephants that consume all the bath water.

His quirky daily life would be any child's fantasy, but Lou only dreams of two things: a normal life and a stuffed cat. How can a child be heard amidst the chaos of the Mouchette family?

A whimsical story full of humor, but not only that. For these invasive animals may also evoke the noisy, hectic world in which our children live. They need calm to express themselves, and we need to listen more closely.

Have you ever seen rabbit ears lounging on the beach in a deckchair? Now you have.


Hariette is awakened by her friend Cécile, a mouse and a fitness coach, for a run. She didn't hear the cuckoo clock alarm or her friend's whistle, something quite unfortunate for a rabbit with big ears. When she woke up, her shocked friend showed her that her ears were missing.

All day, they searched the village for Hariette's ears but couldn't find them. The next morning, they are amazed to find that Cécile and all the village animals have lost their ears. Together, they set out to try and find them.

After Le fantôme en slip, Marion Puech returns with this wildly funny picture book! It's full of laughter, yet also touches on the necessity of quiet, scarce in our hyper-connected world where headphones are ever-present. But what truly intrigues you to read this book is the anticipation of seeing ears... on a deckchair!





Marion Puech

Pavel and Moss


When a rabbit finds a baby panda in the forest and adopts him, which one will grow up faster?

Pavel is a very ordinary rabbit. He likes to get up early, go for walks in the forest and pick red berries. But when he finds a baby among the ferns, his routine is turned upside down. He decides to take care of this tiny creature and names him Moss. With many cuddles, Moss grows rapidly... perhaps too quickly for a rabbit. Could it be that Moss resembles a panda more than a rabbit?

In this new book, Aurore Petit tackles two vital and connected ideas: parenthood and identity formation. What makes us our parents' children, and vice versa? Blood ties? Physical resemblance? Or simply love? With her usual keen observation, the author and illustrator evokes adoption and the questions it raises without dwelling on the subject. All parents face similar doubts and fears and ultimately grow alongside their children...

HIGHLIGHTS:

- By the famous author and illustrator of the series *Une maman, c'est comme une maison* (*A mum is like a home*), which sold 47,500 copies in total and was translated into 14 languages (including Ukrainian and Romanian).
- A picture book with a powerful theme: adoption. In a broader sense, it touches on parenting and how children form their identity.
- · A monument of tenderness AND humour.



The Big Book


Delphine Perret

Pat the Worm's Restaurant




At Pat the Worm's restaurant, the menu is deliciously disgusting. The scenery, in the middle of the compost heap, is very welcoming, and the dishes are unforgettable. To vomit for!

Pat is a worm AND a restaurant owner. Like all great chefs, his wish is to receive his very own star in the very posh Revolting Culinary Guide. But one day, unfortunately, the hand that had been giving Pat delicious rotten produce until then tears it/him Pat away from his compost. He is now tied to the end of a fishing rod! Luckily for him, Pat manages to save his life by befriending the fish and making a pact with them: no way will should they turn into soup!

The laugh out loud funny and fanciful universes of author Ivan Péault and illustrator Mona Granjon beautifully match in this book. Indeed, it is the story of a very smart worm with its own culinary star and deliciously moldy pasta dishes, but underneath it also tackles ecology, compost, waste processing and whether we should eat animals.

Love at First Sight


Jean-Baptiste Drouot

Danny, the Tiny Chipping Who Wanted to See the Sea


