


Martin and the Hummingbirds

later, finds himself in Brazil, the land of hummingbirds.


• Lesson teaches him to look, catalogue and draw. This is the story of a shared passion and a learning experience.

• A sensitive approach shows the vulnerability of some children and the collusion of others. . . school is presented as a unique living hub where each child blossoms among their classmates even if they are very different from one another.

• The narrator Paula has a potato head brimming with ideas in the form of twisted ginger roots!



and experiencing a different childhood, and they'll be fascinated by the goldfish-seller's stall!



• A young African, who calls himself **Baki-the-football-king**, **is recruited by a military group**, **even though he's only 12 years old.** We follow his training sessions and the fighting he's forced to take part in until he is taken prisoner by the enemy.

• Everything changes when Baki the child soldier manages to escape and is taken in by

a refugee camp where at last he learns to read. . .

• Éric Battut's hard-hitting book stands out from his prolific output, not only because of its subject matter, but also because of **the strong but subtle images in fiery colours**, especially in the final scenes where everything calms down and the child becomes Baki-the-schoolteacher back in his village.

• In the hope that the long freeze of the pandemic is over, this short and beautifully crafted text arrives on the children's shelves as a literary homage to the vital world of the bookstore and to the equally important world of young readers.

 This short story is illustrated by a few tiny drawings in the margins

and a vignette on the cover, as stylistic exercise.

• It is about a young reader who can't afford the four volumes of the series he discovers at his bookstore. And there's also the king of the frozen lake, character from the series, who weaves his story into the exchange between the bookseller and the child. They form a bond based on the joy of books and booksellers'

devouring activities. . . and those of book devourers.

• A little slice of literature that whets the appetite for reading.



Jean-Pierre Siméon / Zaü


• A compendium of some 40 short pieces on the theme of our relationship to trees by the famous poet Jean-Pierre Siméon.


• A poem for toddlers, playing on the rhythm of nights and days, on black and white, and the colours that emerge at dawn: a large sun to grab hold of.

• Clever visuals bring the book

alive: night's curtains open gradually, a timid sun breaks through and grows to fill the sky, everything comes

to life, and then, at the end of the day, when the curtains close, all the colours go back to sleep.

• Tomorrow, the child reader will create, with their hands, their first multicoloured poem.



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
