
In this long street of books, there is a window wide open on the cultures of the world, on the freedom to grow up.



• She even shares her snack with them and reads them stories. No one ever disturbs them. And if anyone tries to scare her, a big stag comes to her rescue!


• The delightful images, by the acclaimed illustrator of *Little Panther*, **are full of charm.**



My Blue Home Alain Serres and Edmée Cannard


- A little earthling's magical journey around the universe.

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Momoko's Friends A Japanese Childhood .3 *Kotimi*


- And here are **four new stories** from Kotimi's 1960s Tokyo childhood.
- In this book, we learn about Hanami celebrating the cherry blossom. Showers of pink petals fall on family picnics. Then it's back to school: disappointments, the sorrow of losing friends and the joy of making new ones.
- Kotimi skilfully weaves recipes and handicrafts into her stories.

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• **Sometimes it's bittersweet**, like in this previous story where we follow Momoko when she goes with her disabled younger sister Miyuki to the special centre where she'll also be going back to school.

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• The illustrator Kotimi is Japanese. She grew up in Tokyo in the 1960s and now lives in Paris.


• In this collection she brings us **eight fresh**, **true stories based on her happy childhood** in an ordinary family.

• In this unique, 168-page picture book she tells us about the street games she played, the father she barely knew because he worked such long hours, the chickenpox that stopped her from starting school on time, the tea ceremony at her grandmother's house and her disabled sister who's sometimes annoying, but always loveable.

• Young readers will enjoy discovering a different culture and experiencing a different childhood, and they'll be fascinated by the goldfish-seller's stall!

• She's forced to go to the swimming pool with her school, but she prefers the public baths where there's a huge mural painting depicting Mount Fuji...


• The four stories in this second volume give us a deeper insight into Japan, as experienced by the author-illustrator Kotimi during her own childhood in Tokyo.

- The next day, everyone comes to get their little gift! Unless the birds were a little peckish. . . This is **Alain Serres' first book, written exactly 40 years ago.**
- This third edition features brand-new illustrations, **to encourage today's children** to think about our relationship with others.

- So he made larger and larger nets to bring in a bigger catch, then he built a fish processing plant to help his business grow. . .
- And soon the gulls were complaining that there wasn't anything left for them to eat! And the crabs were panicking: the seabed was becoming a desert!
- The little fisherman has to leave his island to fish elsewhere. There he meets a fishing community who treat the sea with infinite care, tending it like their garden.
- These new friends give him a few seaweed plants and a couple of fish **to bring life back to the seabed** around his island. . .

• So the king's servants have to bring stacks of chairs and mountains of furniture to pile up so that he climb up and get it, but then the whole thing comes tumbling down when he asks for his little chair at the bottom of the stack to be passed up to him!

• Eventually we find him and his crown under a pile of objects. But the king has such a big bump on his head that he can no longer wear his crown!

• From now on, if he's hungry in the night, this ordinary citizen will cook himself a pancake!

• A lively book, with a tall, narrow format, better to reach the moon. . .

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Hurry, hurry, hurry, slow down!



HURRY HURRY HURRY! Clotilde Perrin

• This is a story that travels at 1000 miles an hour. . . until everything changes!

• The alarm clock goes off and our little

hero leaps out of bed, gets dressed and brushes his teeth in two shakes of a lamb's tail, **forgetting to have his breakfast.**

• He races off to meet his friends and the day gets off to a flying start. . . on board an express bus. His journey continues on a speedboat that runs aground, and then it's a frenetic race to try to board an ultrasonic plane!

• But our hero can't run fast enough yet. . . There's nothing for it but turn back. And then, plodding home alone, he can finally listen to the cat's purring, feel a drop of rain on his skin and watch the plane fly into the distance!

• This clever little book invites us to appreciate life's simple pleasures, those tiny everyday moments that are so precious, and to have the courage to slow down!



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

• A compendium of some 40 short pieces on the theme of our relationship to trees by the famous poet Jean-Pierre Siméon, published here for the first time.

The Tree Told Me / From the sun's rays / I give shade in the summer.

• Texts illustrated by **15 two-colour ink drawings by Zaü**; a walk through the woods interspersed with **4 chalk pastel colour spreads.**

The Tree Told Me I was born by chance / but the earth / the birds and human dreams / needed me.

• An intense, luminous book that will **appeal** to children but also to adults who love the forest and words. . .


• A poem for toddlers, playing on the rhythm of nights and days, on black and white, and the colours that emerge at dawn: a large sun to grab hold of.

• Clever visuals bring the book alive: night's curtains open gradually, a timid sun breaks through and grows to fill the sky, everything comes to life, and then, at the end of the day, when the curtains close, all the colours go back to sleep.

• Tomorrow, the child reader will create, with their hands, their first multicoloured poem.

How to Make Peace?

Francis Combes and Bruno Heitz

- A playful anti-war poem that halts the cannon fire. . . while encouraging children to erect monuments to life in village squares!
- The aim is to catch a sleeping tank and, in the children's hands, the scrap metal easily becomes chewing gum. . . Then it's so simple to tie a knot in the cannon!
- The text is followed by its translation into 24 languages: English, Spanish, German, Russian, Ukrainian, Portuguese, Arabic, Hebrew, italian, Bambara, Armenian, Persian, Greek. . . and even that universal language invented at the end of the 19th century: Esperanto !
- On these multilingual pages, Bruno Heitz has old lead soldiers waltzing around in the hands of children, with a banner proclaiming: "Universal disarmament of the Earth and the stars".


The talent of Olivier Tallec

He has published 10 books with Rue du Monde.

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

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



is going to die of boredom. His mother has a solution: "Recite him a poem!" But how do you know what a poem is? Arthur asks the baker, the bicycle repairman, old Mahmoud. . . but each one has only a vague answer: "It's when you love. . ." "It's when you hear the stones' heartbeat. . ."

• But stringing all these answers together ends up forming a poem! And the fish comes back to life. That is the miracle of poetry!
